Course Description: ENG 231 - World Literature I: Major figures and movements in world literature from ancient times to the Renaissance. (3 credits)

Assignments

Book Reports: For each assigned reading, please prepare a 250-350 word book report. These will serve as a study guide for you when it comes time for the final exam. When deciding what information to include in your book report, please consider which information tells us something about where the literature comes from and why we continue to care about it. Data such as the names of an author's three daughters will almost never help us understand a reading. At a minimum, your book report should include: about 50 words summarizing the authorship of a reading, about 100 words summarizing the reading, about 100 words discussing the context and significance of the reading, 3 questions for class discussion. Please submit your book reports through assignment links in Angel (please cut and paste instead of relying on attachments) but also bring a copy with you to class to refer to during discussions.

Quizzes: The publisher of our textbook has prepared quizzes for many of our readings. You will take these quizzes online, outside of class, and submit them to me by email (Courtney.danforth@csn.edu).

Short Essays: Instead of a big paper or project at the end of the semester, we will write short essays (usually 250-500 words) for most readings throughout the semester. I will provide a question or prompt for each assignment and you will submit your short essay (cut and paste--no attachments!) in Angel.

Final Exam: The final exam will include questions from the quizzes, essay questions from the short essays, questions from lectures/films/discussions, and a capstone essay.
